Adams County Open Space Highlights

Each spring, Adams County hosts an informational forum for the public to attend. The theme of this year's open space forum was "Keeping It Wild" and featured many groups and agencies that discussed the importance of wildlife corridors, land preservation, creating wildlife habitats and developing partnerships. Adams County residents continue to show interest in open space preservation as evidenced by a 30 percent increase in attendance over last year's forum.

Grant training workshops for jurisdictions and interested residents were held in the eastern and western sections of the county.

An audit process for all projects funded with Open Space Sales Tax grants was developed and implemented to ensure accountability and integrity of the Open Space Program.



How Your Adams County Open Space Sales Tax Funds Are Distributed

2% administrative costs



30% distributed back to the jurisdiction within the county where the sales tax was collected for open space projects

68% awarded to qualifying jurisdictions as open space grants twice a year

Adams County Open Space Sales Tax Facts

- Tax passed on November 2, 1999
- 1/5th of one cent on each dollar with food and other items excluded
- Length of the current tax is seven years and set to expire on December 31, 2006
- Tax reauthorized and extended 20 years by voters and increased to 1/4th of one cent starting January 1, 2007
- 2005 revenue collected was \$7,710,806
- A seven-member Open Space Advisory Board reviews grants and recommends funding
- Three members come from cities within the county and four from unincorporated Adams County
- Uses include land preservation of open space, habitat, rivers, creeks, trails, conservation easements for farmland, parks, ballfields, recreation and environmental education projects
